JAYNE'S JOTTINGS

Earlier on this month, I spent time deadheading not only my one and only rose but my mum's as well (she has a lot!). Whilst I understand they look better for the attention I am giving them and they then keep on blooming but I still find them messy and after spending so much time deadheading, imagine my annoyance when I sit down, look out the window and yes, you've guessed it! Another bloom gives up the ghost and more petals drop to the ground. Grrr...

22/6/22 – it is now later in the month and we have just experienced a very hot spell indeed. Water, water – that is all I seem to be doing. I have even succumbed to using the hose! You see, I prefer to use the watering can to water my fuchsias as I can get close to each plant to ensure none get missed.

This hot weather has caused problems for me. I decided to move a climbing jasmine which was in a pot located close to the kitchen window. I decided to move it half way down the front garden. Silly move! Moving it from a rather sheltered position into full sun was not a clever thing to do during this hot spell. It now has very scorched leaves!

I have finally got round to potting up my Verbena Bonariensis plants which I grew from seed last year. I have grouped them together in bigger planters and positioned them strategically in the front garden.

PROJECT 2 - FUCHSIA BONSAI



✓ I am pleased to see new growth on this bonsai and I have taken advice and scraped away at the base showing roots. However, I now need to top dress with horticultural grit or some kind of ornamental grit/stone.

Whilst this one is showing good growth, I am conscious that its main stem may exceed 4cm, hence it cannot be grown as a bush (unless I report and sink it into a bigger pot.) This would need to be done 3 months prior to the show, if I was going to enter it into the show. I may, however, train it as a bonsai, it probably sits better under this category. Therefore, it will need repotting into a ceramic bonsai pot.

The above photos were taken early on in the season. They have now put on a lot of foliage and have been trimmed and shaped. As we speak, they are coming on a treat, however, there is still time for things to go wrong!

Sadly, both Joe Bragg and Jack Atkinson passed away. Both were active members of our society.


1998 – Ken Brown proposed that the Presidency should run a 3 year term.







JUNE – On the noticeboard this month is the list of Best in Triphylla Classes; Banksian medal Winners & President's Cup Winners: -



BANKSIAN MEDAL

- This was first awarded in 2013 to Howard Kilbourn.
- Both Howard Kilbourn and Lyndon Clements are 3 time winners of this prestigious award.
- Christine Cole is the only female winner to date.

PRESIDENT'S CUP

- The President's cup was introduced in 2009 when June Lemon-Smith was President.
- Lyndon Clements was the first to be awarded this cup. The cup is awarded to the exhibit of the President's choice.
- In 2017, there was a tie, the President could not decide between two exhibits and hence it was agreed that the winners could share the cup and would each be custodian for 6 months.

BEST TRIPHYLLA IN SHOW

- The trophy was donated by Geoff Smith and was introduced in 2015.
- The first winner was Howard Kilbourn.
- Geoff Smith, himself, to date, has been awarded it twice; 2016 and 2021.

A FUCHSIA ENTHUSIAST'S CALENDAR

JULY

- Flowers should be everywhere, so admire and remember to jot down any that really take your fancy
- Keep a keen eye on your own plants; continue to deadhead and to remove any dead leaves
- Visit as many shows as you can
- Don't be afraid to ask the experts any questions
- If you are doubtful about the name of any in your collection, take along a twig of it containing flowers, buds and foliage, as someone may just recognize it
- Continue with regular feeding both inside and outside the greenhouse
- Get to know your plant... Make a note of any idiosyncrasies that you see amongst your plants – some may need more feeding or root space than others, less water or object to being severely pinched
- Plants out in the garden will now be in full bloom. If you have planted them too closely together this will now be easily noticeable
- Keep an eye open for any pests and diseases that may be lurking out there and deal with them before they become too severe
- Be ready to stop and chat to admirers when you are tending your beautiful plants in the front garden

FUCHSIAS IN MY GARDEN



✓ SYLVIA BARKER (1973)

Single, white waxy tube, long medium thickness. Sepals; waxy white with green tips. Corolla; scarlet with a slight smoky cast, small bloom. Foliage; dark green with outstanding veins, small to medium-sized, serrated leaves. Growth; lax, bushy, vigorous, free-flowering bush.

In the beginning of the month, I felt it was safe to remove all my plastic greenhouse covers (with the exception of my walk-in greenhouse). The fuchsias seemed to have put on a lot of growth and were thankful to be out in the fresh air. All I need to do now is to remember to turn; pinch out and feed!

Big pots will need to be displayed around the garden; all needing to be spaced out a little – somehow!

It seems a good time to take stock of what I still need to do: -

- Pot on rooted fuchsia cuttings
- Review fuchsias to identify possible show exhibits checking the schedule closely at all times!
- Ensure shading is positioned over the greenhouses in case we experience another hot spell!
- Half baskets take out the snapdragons which I had planted last year and replace with fuchsias.
- Choose a trailing fuchsia to put in the metal basket at the top of an obelisk.

SHOWING FUCHSIAS

If you are thinking of showing for the first time, here are a few tips to help you on your way:

- Read the Schedule carefully.
- Use a terracotta coloured pot, unless specified in the schedule.
- Clear any surface debris.
- Remove dead flowers & foliage.
- Check your plant complies with the schedule, i.e. correct size pot.
- Always ensure you have saucers under your pots bring some extra, just in case (and pots!)

Prior to the show: -

- Turn your plants regularly to ensure even growth and flowers.
- Pinch out, but allowing enough time for buds to form and flower in time for the show.
- Feed and water regularly.
- Deadhead.

I have been studying the schedule and highlighted the classes I hope to enter. At this time of year, everything looks promising because the fuchsias are behaving, it's as we get closer to show day when they start to rebel and become unruly and I start crossing them off one by one!

I have set aside the regular plants that I usually take or have relied upon previously. This year I have concentrated on planters (<u>Class 24</u> - Patio Container, must contain at least one fuchsia). This is a class I usually like to enter but failed to do so last year, so I am determined to put this right this year.

I was curious to know what cultivars would be acceptable in <u>Class 15</u> – 1 plant (bush/shrub), any cultivar except Triphylla raised BEFORE 1914 (must be named) and should have a natural appearance. So they must be old cultivars. I have gone through past records to see what cultivars have appeared on the show bench and come either 1^{st} ; 2^{nd} or 3^{rd} : -
