BLACK PRINCE – Banks 1961

A single, with Red tubes and sepals. Coralla is dark purple. It will make a good small pot plant or can be trained in a basket with weights.

GROWING FUCHSIAS

I have continued to feed them and plan to turn them and give them another pinch out. I am busy potting up cuttings which I have taken earlier on in the season – so busy, busy!

PROJECT 1 - STANDARDS



This is a couple of years old now. It has four trunks and in 'bonsai speak' would possibly be classed as a Grouping. However, after referring to the BFS Exhibitors, Judges and Stewards handbook, I believe it could fall under a 'Decorative Standard': -

"...be grown with multiple trunks to form the appearance of several trees with a single head. Trunks should be free from blemishes such as tie marks, but may show more natural imperfections".



The best part of growing fuchsias is to experiment – to have fun. I don't know what this standard started life as but I seem to be training it now as 2 spheres on a stick!
