## JAYNE'S JOTTINGS

Now that all the shows have ended, I will soon be thinking of overwintering. I will however try not to make the same mistake as I did last year. Last year, I potted up a lot of my fuchsias – to make them more show-worthy, for example: -

- To bury the bottom branches to avoid gapping at the bottom of bush or shrub.

However, what I forgot to do was check the schedules and pot sizes as I found that by potting up resulted in them no longer being eligible for the classes I would normally enter! So I will have to have the schedules at hand this year to refer to!

Also, by transferring the plants into bigger pots result in the plants growing bigger and bigger and that has caused an issue this year, because at the height of the season, I was running out of space!

I had two hanging pots this year, which did really well – '*Marinka*' and '*La Campanella*' – I may now be tempted to try and create a couple more, if I can decide on the right cultivar! Watch this space!

Although it takes a long time, this overwintering business, it is a time for reflection, to consider what went well and, of course, what didn't. I also start planning what to do next year, I'm already contemplating starting off a spiral using some of my *F. magellanica* type cuttings, which is very robust and which I think will be ideal for this kind of shape.

**2006** – Thanks to the help and commitment of society members a display of George Roe cultivars was put on to commemorate the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of George Roe's 1<sup>st</sup> cultivar - 'Lady Thumb'.

**2006** – Knitted items were sold alongside the cake stall and book stall.

**2007** - Ken Brown was offered the new title 'Honorary Life Past President' in recognition of all Ken's continued contribution to the society.

**2007** – Renee Wilson opened her garden in aid of the Stapleford Methodist Church, and our members were all invited.

**2008** – We introduced the free '**unnamed**' cutting for the 1<sup>st</sup> time, which proved successful but it was decided it needed to be a single cultivar so that members could be clear when to stop pinching out etc.

**2009** – Introduction of the President's Cup – proposed by June Lemon (President at that time)

**2010** – Book Internet sales earned the society - £42

**2010** - Promotional events were held at Reuben Shaws and Moores Nurseries to help raise the profile of the Society.

**2010** – Beginners classes were introduced supporting our newer Society members – 9 attended the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting.

**Judges** – We have two judges; A BFS Affiliated Judge who judges the Fuchsia Classes and another judge who is an expert in his/her field judging the miscellaneous classes. This does seem to work for us.

Since COVID, the presenting of Trophies has taken place at the August monthly meeting and our President, Geoff Smith has presented the Trophies.

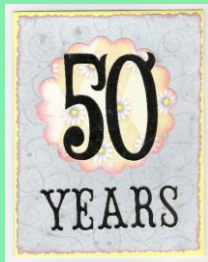

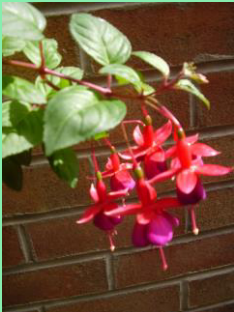

# FUCHSIAS IN MY GARDEN



My fuchsias, this year have been flowering non-stop, even through the severe heatwave, I am pleased to say that they have been a joy. Better planning and arranging within the garden will be my priority in 2023.

# GROWING FUCHSIAS

*This article featured in our Newsletter – October 2003 and originally in the BFS Fuchsia News in 1992: -*

There are two basic things required to get your fuchsias through the winter:

1. They must be kept frost-free, even hardy ones. If they are in a planter or pot they will have their roots 'frosted'. They can be stored successfully in a heated greenhouse or other suitable room or building, provided they are kept at approximately 40 degrees Fahrenheit.
2. Their compost must never be allowed to dry out.

Initially, plants should be put outside from the end of August or early September to allow the wood to ripen/harden off prior to a light pruning of the soft green growth.

Start to reduce watering but still add a little potash to the water to help harden the wood.

When the leaves start to 'yellow' cut off or hand pick off all the leaves. This helps in the control of pests which will over-winter on any which remain on the plant.

Completely immerse the top of the plants (not the pot) in a solution of Systemic Insecticide and Fungicide.

Continue to withhold water allowing the compost to become barely moist.

Additional covering with newspaper or sacking can be used in very severe weather to keep frost at bay.

Keep an eye on the compost, never let it dry out. Use tepid water only when the plant is dry.

This applies to all fuchsias except that Standards should be laid on their sides and turned regularly to prevent sap becoming dormant on one side of the plant only.
